The Montréal Science Centre receives a prestigious prize from the Société des musées du Québec

The Mini Mondo exhibition wins a prize for excellence

Little over a year after its launch, the *Mini Mondo* exhibition is awarded a prestigious prize from the SMQ, Québec's provincial museum association, in recognition of its excellent museum practices. The high calibre exhibition, recognized for its inclusivity and presentation in no less than six languages, was designed to introduce children ages 0 to 7 to eco-citizenship through a highly immersive approach.

- Mini Mondo is the very first exhibition designed using the Genderbased Analysis Plus (GBA Plus) process.



A Prize-Winning Exhibition Like No Other

Mini Mondo was created and developed by the Science Centre's very own team as a permanent exhibition and has veritably made its mark. Its design features three zones from the everyday lives of its young audiences — the forest, the river, and the city. The exhibition space offers little ones a fascinating and interactive world where they can explore and discover their environment. Using a hands-on, free-play approach, the exhibition invites them to handle objects, hear sounds, and engage in activities designed to stimulate all their sense.

Presented not only in English and French, the *Mini Mondo* world also allows its audiences to explore the space in four other languages which reflect the linguistic backgrounds of Montréal's recent immigrant communities; Arabic, Creole, Spanish, and Mandarin.

A Fundamentally Inclusive Exhibition

Mini Mondo is also the very first exhibition created using the diversity-sensitive Gender-based Analysis Plus process (GBA Plus) which also aims to develop inclusive spaces and experiences that reflect the cultural and ethnic backgrounds of all kinds of families.

Through this approach, the Science Centre's team performed a careful analysis of the different barriers that members of recent immigrant communities face in an effort to understand how the Montréal Science Centre's spaces might be unknowingly contributing to them.
